

The Call to Make Spiritual Retreat Written on Tuesday January 17th, 2017

From January 9th through January 13th I was in Novato, California at Trumbull Manor, a Conference Center run by Opus Dei for my annual canonical retreat. The obligation for clergy to make an annual retreat comes from the official law of the Church. This law, known as Canon Law governs the Catholic Church and her members throughout the entire world. The legal system of the Catholic Church is the oldest continuous legal system in the world. It has been revised through the centuries, but many of its prescriptions have their origin in the first millennium. In regard to spiritual retreats for Clergy the prescription is found in Canon 276 §1 which reads: "In leading their lives, clerics are bound in a special way to pursue holiness since, having been consecrated to God by a new title in the reception of orders, they are dispensers of the mysteries of God in the service of His people."

Canon 276 §2 part 4 reads "In order to be able to pursue this perfection they are equally bound to make time for spiritual retreats according to the prescripts of particular law." This weekend Deacon Ramsey is making his annual canonical retreat at King's House in Buffalo, Minnesota. Spiritual retreats can take several forms. It can be a solitary experience in a hermitage, such as at Pacem in Terris located in Isanti, Minnesota. It can be an individual or group retreat at a monastery like St. John's Abbey in Collegeville, where you meet daily with a monk to serve as a spiritual director. It can be a group retreat at a center such as at King's House in Buffalo operated by the

Oblates of Mary Immaculate, or the Jesuit Retreat House at Demontreville in Lake Elmo. In these group retreats a retreat master and preacher will give spiritual conferences to the group, and will make time to meet one on one with retreat goers so they can have direction in their spiritual life. Group retreats for laity are usually planned as weekend retreats beginning on Thursday night and continuing through Sunday midday. These retreats are held for men, women, or married couples at various times through the year. If you have never been on a spiritual retreat, one of the best things you can do for your spiritual life and your walk with God is to go on a retreat. By leaving the world for a few days, unplugging from technology and finding a place where the noise and busyness of life can be forgotten not only will you meet God in a more intense way and foster greater love for God you can also

come to discover more deeply who you truly are. Retreats are likewise opportunities to recommit to a plan of life. A plan of life is simply the daily, weekly and monthly spiritual and ascetical practices you follow to maintain and deepen your friendship with God as well as to cultivate the manner in which you fulfill the command to love your neighbor as yourself. A plan of life is a road map for living the life of faith in an intentional manner. I am including several web addresses of these various retreat center's in our local area, so you have an opportunity to see what is available. I pray you will consider making a spiritual retreat. 

January 25 is the feast of the Conversion of St. Paul and the end of the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity. What does one have to do with the other?



The Week of Prayer for Christian Unity consists of eight days beginning January 18, at that time the feast of the Chair of Peter, and ending on January 25, the feast of the Conversion of St. Paul. The Franciscan Friars of the Atonement, founded in the early twentieth century in Graymoor, NY, sought to promote unity among Anglicans and Roman Catholics. Paul James Wattson, a former Episcopalian priest, founded the community, which was formally accepted into the Catholic communion.

The idea for Christian unity soon began to catch on, and by the 1930s, more and more Christians welcomed such a focus. Suggestions for prayer and education are distributed each year, emphasizing a jointly chosen theme. The 1964 Vatican II document on ecumenism, *Unitatis Redintegratio*, gave a great boost to the octave, so that today many Christians worldwide promote and participate in the octave time of prayer.

The emphasis on both Peter and Paul aptly fits into the rationale of the octave. Peter is seen as the source of unity within the Christian tradition. Paul is highlighted due to his vision of bringing all to Christ. The Week of Prayer for Christian Unity is an ideal opportunity to pray for and promote respect, understanding, and, hopefully, eventual unity among Christians.

St. Genevieve

St. Genevieve was born in Nanterre near Paris in 422. She became a nun at the age of 15 and moved to Paris, where she became known for her piety. When Attila the Hun marched on Paris, Genevieve convinced the inhabitants to pray and fast. Attila retreated, leaving Paris untouched. Again, when King Childeric occupied Paris, she crossed enemy lines to bring food to prisoners and convinced the king to release them. She is the patroness of Paris.

Hope in God

Even the saints experienced times when their faith in God's goodness was tested, yet they never gave up hope; they knew that whatever happened, God's unchanging love would see them through. When you feel disheartened, pray for God's grace and hope in him.

"I have told you this that you might have peace in me. In the world you will have trouble, but take courage, I have conquered the world" (John 16:33).

Resolve to have perfect faith

Imagine having complete confidence that God was with you in all things. Think how differently you would respond to troubles, temptations, or hardships. Worry would be obsolete. That's perfect faith and it is

possible. Here's how.

Believe in God's
love. Perfect faith
comes from
believing that
God loves you
without limit or
condition. God is
love, so to believe in
God is to believe in his
love. "Trust in the Lord with all
your heart, on your own intelligence
do not rely" (Proverbs 3:5). The key is to
remember that God loves you and only
wills your good.

Banish fear. "There is no fear in love, but perfect love drives out fear because fear has to do with punishment, and so one who fears is not yet perfect in love" (1 John 4:18). We were not created to be

afraid. It is Satan who wishes to drive a wedge between us and God and tempts us to fear. When we remember that God has consistently proven himself to be faithful and dependable, only faith is left.

Practice makes perfect.

Perfect faith results

when we live God's word, not just hear it. Adhering to the Ten Commandments, the Beatitudes and the two Great Commandments (love God, love your neighbor), we notice God's hand in our lives and trust in him grows.

Why Do Catholics Do That

Why do Catholics call Jesus "Christ"?

"Christ" is not Jesus' last name, but a title. It comes from the Greek "Christos," which means "Anointed One." Ancient Jews enthroned their kings in a ceremony by anointing them with oil. This anointing distinguished the king as being the

one chosen by God to deliver Israel from its enemies. So in calling Jesus "Christ," Christians affirm not only his Lordship over all creation, but also his mission as Savior and the promised Messiah of the Jews.
