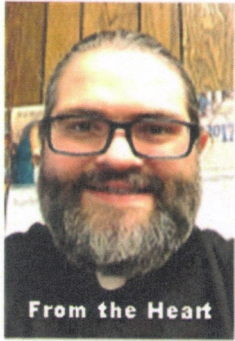

Pastor's Page Fr. Bryan J.B. Pedersen



Throughout history some of the greatest atrocities have been committed because of the denial of human dignity to a group or class of persons. The holocaust of six million Jews during the second World War being foremost among them. Race based slavery is but another example. The bloodiest war as far as casualties of U.S. Citizens go was the American Civil War. By the end of the Civil War slavery was outlawed in the United States. It would take another hundred years before the Civil Rights era of the late 1950's and 1960's ended race-based discrimination in law also doing away with the "Jim Crow" laws. The Trail of Tears, part of the Cherokee Removal was the forced relocation between 1836 and 1839 of the Cherokee Nation from their lands in Georgia, South Carolina, North Carolina, Tennessee, Texas, and Alabama to the Indian Territory (present day Oklahoma) in the then Western United States. An estimated 4000 Cherokee died along the way and at the end of the movement. When one class of persons, or a race of people are deemed to be less human simply because of the color of their skin, their faith and ethnicity, or because they are deemed to be worth less than other human beings great evils have been perpetrated.

An atrocity of our own day and a great evil that we live with is the denial of human dignity to the pre-born child in the womb. This class of persons, the pre-born, are valued less in law than those who are already born. The sad tragedy of our day is that the value of a pre-born child is now legally dependent upon the will of the mother. If the mother places value on her child and chooses to recognize the human dignity of her child, then the law values her child. If the mother does not place value on her pre-born child, then neither does the law.

Here is the truth – "From your first moments of existence, you had all the DNA that would determine your sex, facial features, physique, and the color of your skin, hair, and eyes. At 24 days, your heart began beating. By 8 weeks, all your organs were present, and your unique fingerprints were forming. Ultrasounds show that by 18 weeks, you could swim, somersault, suck your thumb, and even cover your ears if you heard loud music. If you'd been born just 23 weeks after conception, your chance of survival would be 50-80 percent; by 25 weeks, it's over 90 percent, and that's still months before full-term birth." ¹ If someone takes an innocent person's life after he or she is born, it's against the law; just minutes before birth, it's legal in most states and called abortion. The only real difference is a declaration by the United States Supreme Court in *Roe v. Wade* (1973).

In the 1990's President Bill Clinton said that abortion should be safe, legal, and rare. I recently saw an argument on social media that with a new 5-4 conservative majority on the Supreme Court that soon *Roe v. Wade* will be over-turned, and because of that abortion will no longer be safe since it will then have to return to the back-alleys of American streets. **The truth is Abortion is never safe for the pre-born child.** If you saw the recent film *Gosnell: The Trial of America's Biggest Serial Killer*, you recognize clearly **abortion is never safe even for the mother.** I saw the film last Monday and I recommend it to you, if by chance your still able to see it that is. Due to a kind of [industry self-censorship the main stream media is ignoring the film](#). If you see it your conscience will be stirred. Here is the truth – "Abortion results in the death of a child. For many mothers, abortion causes severe and long-lasting emotional, psychological, and spiritual trauma. Many women experience overwhelming guilt, shame, and grief. Other effects have also been documented:

depression, withdrawal from others, eating disorders, self-punishing behaviors like "cutting," sexual dysfunction and problems with intimacy, alcohol and drug dependency, problems bonding with other or subsequent children, abortion-related nightmares, and other sleep problems."²

Christianity has from the beginning taught that Abortion is a grave evil. In The Didache – The Teaching of the Twelve Apostles, a text that dates to the 1st century we read the following:

"There are two ways, one of life and one of death; and between the two ways there is a great difference. Now, this is the way of life...The second commandment of the Teaching: "Do not murder; do not commit adultery"; do not corrupt boys; do not fornicate; "do not steal"; do not practice magic; do not go in for sorcery; **do not murder a child by abortion or kill a newborn infant.** "Do not covet your neighbor's property; do not commit perjury; do not bear false witness"; do not slander; do not bear grudges. Do not be double-minded or double-tongued, for a double tongue is "a deadly snare." Your words shall not be dishonest or hollow, but substantiated by action. Do not be greedy or extortionate or hypocritical or malicious or arrogant. Do not plot against your neighbor. Do not hate anybody; but reprove some, pray for others, and still others love more than your own life."

"Even if many Catholics and other Christians have been seduced by the world and either promote or accept legal abortion the Church has consistently taught that every human life is precious and worthy of protection. Every intentional abortion is gravely wrong.³ In April 2018, Pope Francis wrote: "Our defense of the innocent unborn ... needs to be clear, firm and passionate, for at stake is the dignity of a human life, which is always sacred and demands love for each person, regardless of his or her stage of development."⁴

The Church does not approach difficult pregnancy decisions with a false "either/or" mentality, pitting mother against child. For example, a baby conceived in rape is not an aggressor deserving death by abortion. She is innocent, like her mother. They both deserve compassionate care and support, not more violence. Abortion doesn't bring healing or peace, but both can be found in the courageous decision to give birth to the baby.

Very rarely, continuing a pregnancy may put a mother's life at risk—for example, because of a tubal pregnancy or aggressive uterine cancer. It is morally licit to remove the threat to the mother's life by removing the cancerous uterus or the fallopian tube where the child implanted, even though it is foreseeable that the child will die as an indirect and unintended result of such surgery. But abortion—a direct and intentional taking of a child's life—is never morally permissible."⁵

What are we to do? We must love mother and child. Support women who need help during and after difficult pregnancies through the work of your diocesan Respect Life office and local pregnancy care centers. Educate yourself and others about struggles some experience after abortion, and find out where to refer those seeking help at www.hopeafterabortion.org

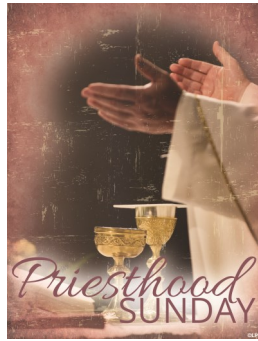

GOSPEL MEDITATION

October 28, 2018 30th Sunday in Ordinary Time

"Son of David, have pity on me!" Has the cry of Bartimaeus ever escaped your lips? Today's Gospel tells the story of a blind man with a difficult lot in life. He made a living by begging coins off passing travelers. When word reaches him that Jesus will be passing by, this is when he begins to shout for mercy. Jesus hears Bartimaeus' cry and beckons him forward. "What do you want me to do for you?" Last week, Jesus asked a similar question to James and John. Their response was a clutch for fame. Bartimaeus' response is much humbler. "Lord, I want to see." How strange this interaction must have seemed to the onlookers. The man is blind! Of course he wants to see! But Jesus is always teaching us. By asking us what we want, Jesus reveals the dispositions of our hearts. God already knows them, but do we? By asking James and John to name their ambition, their selfishness is exposed to them and to the other disciples. By asking Bartimaeus to name his longing, his faith is exposed to the entire crowd. Jesus invites participation in our own redemption. He doesn't save us without us!

Take some time in silent prayer today. Place yourself in this story of Bartimaeus. Imagine yourself there on the dusty, crowded roadside. Jesus is calling you! When you stand before him, his focus is on you and you alone. "What do you want me to do for you?" he asks. Search your heart. How would you respond? What part of your heart is Jesus asking you to expose? He has come to heal and to restore. May we, too, be sent! "Go ... your faith has saved you."

LIVE THE LITURGY - INSPIRATION FOR THE WEEK

As Pope Francis has reminded us, it is in living the Beatitudes that we find the path to holiness. The Beatitudes are not a list of do's and don'ts. Rather, they are a road map to finding our way to others and to the kingdom of God. It is when we enter into the human condition with all of its pain and sorrow that we discover again the creative presence of God guiding us to greater wholeness. Being poor in spirit ? being meek and humble ? mourning our sorrow and losses and walking with others through theirs ? hungering and thirsting for righteousness ? being merciful ? maintaining a clean heart ? pursuing peace ? daily taking up the challenge of the Gospel. All bring us into the mystery of humanity and indeed into the mystery of God. The pathway to our relationships and the blueprint detailing our responsibilities are revealed. Are we ready to roll up our sleeves and get dirty?

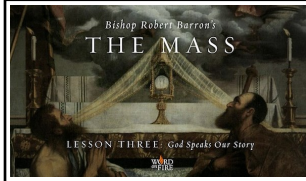

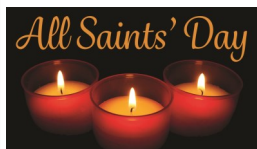


PRE-BAPTISM CLASSES

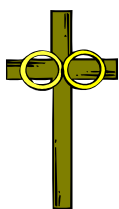
