

Pastor's Page Fr. Bryan J.B. Pedersen

At the beginning of November, we celebrated the other worldly dimension of the Catholic Faith with a celebration of All Saints on November 1st, and the Commemoration of All Souls on November 2nd. Each in their own way is an expression in our belief in the Communion of Saints.

The first day focuses on those who have gone before us who are in heaven. As Jesus himself noted "In my Father's house there are many dwelling places. If there were not, would I have told you that I am going to prepare a place for you?^{*} And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come back again and take you to myself, so that where I am you also may be. <u>Where I am going you know the way.</u>" John 14:2-4. Jesus is the way to the Father's House, Jesus is the way to heaven.

The second day focuses on those who have gone before us who are in preparation for heavenly life. The place where these souls reside is commonly known as "purgatory". Purgatory is not a kind of second chance for believers. The souls in purgatory have but one destination heavenly life.

The Catechism of the Catholic Church notes that: "All who die in God's grace and friendship, but still imperfectly purified, are indeed assured of their eternal salvation; but after death they undergo purification, so as to achieve the holiness necessary to enter the joy of heaven" (1030).

"Be perfect, therefore, as your heavenly Father is perfect." Matthew 5:48. Our heavenly Father is the standard, who has given us the image of his Son. One of the most popular books of the middle ages was the Imitation of Christ by Thomas a 'Kempis. The acronym WWJD: What would Jesus do? Is popular for a reason. While there are some who have allowed the love of Christ to transform every aspect of how they live their lives, and hence we call them saints. For most of us we have experienced the love of Christ, and love like Christ in many respects, but sometimes not in everything. Thankfully, the Lord loves us so much that he gives us a place where we receive the necessary purification so that our entire being can love like Christ.

The month of November has long been associated with our assistance of the souls in purgatory. They are in a passive state, but we on earth can actively give our prayers, works, joys, and sufferings each day to the Sacred Heart of Jesus. Since we are members of His body, Jesus receives all we give him and joins it to his own offering to the Father. This is what St. Paul means when he writes in his letter to the Colossians: "Now I rejoice in my sufferings for your sake, and in my flesh, I complete what is lacking in Christ's afflictions for the sake of his body, that is, the church."

According to the Catholic Encyclopedia, the clearest Bible reference about prayers for the dead is from the Second Book of Maccabees. When soldiers were preparing the bodies of their slain comrades for burial, they discovered they were wearing amulets taken from a pagan temple which violated the law of Deuteronomy so they prayed that God would forgive the sin these men had committed.

The New Testament echoes this notion in the second letter of Timothy when Paul prays for someone who died named Onesiphorus, saying: "May the Lord grant him to find mercy from the Lord on that day."

Today, prayers for the dead begin at the moment of death, often when family members are gathered around the bedside of the person who has died. Those prayers continue during wake services where prayers and rosaries are often said, and continue with the Funeral Mass itself, and also at the Committal service at the graveside. But our prayers for our deceased loved ones continue. Every Mass has a ministerial intention that is often for a deceased person. We likewise bring our own intention for both the living and the dead with us when we participate in Holy Mass. The month of November is specially suited for visits to the cemetery to the graveside of a beloved. Whenever you go to the Cemetery or even pass by while driving make it a regular practice to say one of the following prayers:

- 1) May the souls of the faithful departed through the mercy of God rest in peace. Amen.
- Eternal rest grant unto them (him/her), O Lord. And Let perpetual light shine upon them (him/her). Amen. May their (his/her) soul(s), and the souls of all the faithful departed through the mercy of God rest in peace. Amen.
- 3) O God, by whose mercy the faithful departed find rest, send your holy Angel to watch over this grave. Through Christ our Lord. Amen.

GOSPEL MEDITATION ENCOURAGE DEEPER UNDERSTANDING OF SCRIPTURE

"Some Saducees, those who deny that there is a resurrection, came forward and put this question to Jesus ..." In this Sunday's Gospel, the Saducees avoid their real question. Is there a resurrection from the dead or not? Rather than ask this question point blank, the Saducees try to prove their point through a roundabout, unrealistic scenario. Jesus cuts straight to the question behind the question, citing Scripture passages relating to the resurrection.

The Saducees are trying to trick Jesus. While we may not intend to stump God, our doubts and questions may have more in common with the Saducees than we care to admit. Doubts are part and parcel of life in a fallen world. Still, there are different ways we can word our doubts to ourselves, God, and others. When we're struggling, truly struggling, about some article of faith, do we admit it? Or do we cloak it with other, obtuse questions to hide the nature of our concern?

Have you considered leaving the Church over the hypocrisy of some of her members and leaders? Perhaps the real question is: "How can a place blessed by God and instituted by Christ have this evil in it? Can I reconcile with the concept that an institution has an admixture of good and bad? What do I expect from others, from myself? What responsibility do I have to try and remedy evil in an institution I'm part of?" Perhaps you've wondered about the nature of romantic love, and if God is love, does He really care so much about the details of this particular scenario? Perhaps the real question is: "Can my mind wrap around the concept of a God whose law seems - on the surface, in this situation — to make people unhappy? What is the relationship between the moral law and human flourishing?" These aren't easy questions, but they are more honest ones. This week, don't be afraid of your deeper questions! Bring them to God, to someone you trust, and to yourself.

LIVE THE LITURGY - INSPIRATION FOR THE WEEK

Our God is a God of the living. In God, there is no death. While life certainly presents hardships and has its measure of suffering, God does not promise anyone, not even his own Son, a way around it. What He does promise is His abiding, all-sustaining presence as a source of courage and hope so that we can more gracefully and purposefully endure it. Our faith in the Gospel message of Jesus Christ reminds us to carry the hope of resurrection with us in all things. We must never lose sight of the fact that we are works in progress and that what we see and experience here is only the beginning of greater marvels to come. This is why people like St. Paul and others of great faith consider their sufferings as nothing compared to the glory yet to be revealed.

WHY DO WE DO THAT? - CATHOLIC LIFE EXPLAINED Resurrection of the Dead

Question:

What do Catholics believe about the resurrection of the dead?

Answer:

Every Sunday, we proclaim in the Creed that we believe "in the resurrection of the body." Does that mean Christ's resurrection or our own? Both! Jesus' resurrection is part of the work of salvation, but it's also a sign of what's to come. While death separates our bodies and our souls, this was not the intention of God when He first created us. It's an effect of original sin. At the end of time, our bodies and our souls will be reunited.

Scientifically, we may have questions about this, since bodies decompose over the course of centuries. Or what about the saints, whose relics are spread around the earth? How the resurrection will happen is a mystery. But we know that our resurrected body will be our body. If we are in heaven, our body will be in a glorified state. Some theologians speculate what this glorification will be like based on Jesus' resurrected body. Will we be able to walk through walls? Will we eat, since Jesus broke bread with his disciples? We don't really know the answers to these questions. We do know, however, that we will be free from the effects of the fall (such as sickness and pain) and physical defects that occurred in life. Christ redeems us as whole persons, body and soul!
