Ruminations on Societal Challenges

These past few weeks since the tragic death of George Floyd due to the actions of Officer Derek Chauvin as fellow officers looked on has been with few exceptions universally condemned by our society as a whole. Who of us watching this scene looked on without disbelief, anger, and frustration? As peaceful protests broke out first in Minneapolis, and then throughout the country, the righteous anger experienced by so many was felt by others as sheer rage. Added to this were those seeking to take advantage of the situation either for personal gain, political reasons, or to obtain vengeance against perceived slights whether real or imagined, and suddenly what was once peaceful became rioting and looting.

Two weeks ago, on Sunday May 31st, 2020 I had the opportunity to visit 38th Avenue S. and Chicago in South Minneapolis to visit the site of George Floyd's death. I had joined a number of Clergy and laity from various denominations. We went to pray. What I experienced that day was peaceful protest open to a multiplicity of voices. Not every message spoken was congruous as different speakers had different ideas. But what was clear was the difference between peaceful protest on the one hand, and riots, looting, and violence on the other hand.

It got me thinking about the many contradictions felt in American life. For example, immigrants the world over have continuously sought in past times and today to come to the United States because of the opportunities our American way of life affords. Those seeking entrance to our nation do so not because they see all the flaws of America, but because they see the fundamental goodness of the American experiment and the opportunities that await them. I don't think they are blind to the challenges, but they see in America a better life for them and their children than remaining in their homelands. At the same time, we recognize the failures of our past whether it be the institution of race-based slavery and treatment of indigenous peoples, or the Jim Crow laws and segregation. We also recognize the challenges of our present. No one of us wants to live in a society where those sworn to protect violate their charge. It is often said that the corruption of the best is the worst. When you look at the mission of the police – to keep the peace and protect the innocent from those who would do them harm we see a lofty mission. But, when that trust is betrayed even by a few, it leads many to doubt the very goodness of the profession. Those in the priesthood know this well.

A little thought experiment can helps us: What if the events of 9/11/2001 – the day Al Qaeda Terrorist turned jet airplanes into flying weapons taking down the Twin Towers known as the World Trade Center - was separated in time by only a month from 05/25/2020 – the day Derek Chauvin knelt on George Floyd's neck for 8 minutes 45 seconds causing his death? What if? In the aftermath of 9/11, we celebrated the heroic men and women serving in law enforcement for their heroism as they rushed into the chaos with Firefighters and Emergency personnel seeking to save the lives of those trapped in the flame filled tower. Both towers would collapse that same morning. The names of those public servants – police, fire, and emergency workers are read annually, and their service is praised. In the aftermath of 5/25, there are multiple voices from across the socio-economic and cultural divide, even from elected officials, calling for the dismantling and defunding of police departments in reaction to the action of Officer Derek Chauvin and those like him who have abused their power. What if these events were separated by only one month's time? Would these contradictory messages of praise for police on the one hand, and the dismantling of police on the other still be in the national conversation?

There is an important principle that all of us must relearn. **We must never confuse the part with the whole.** Why is racism still a problem in our society? People continually identify the part with the whole. Thus, if someone is robbed at gun point by an African American male, then all African American males are criminals and thugs which is absurd. Here the part is confused with the whole. Or, if a white police officer uses excessive force against a person of color, then all white police officers, or police officers are inherently racist, which is likewise absurd. Again, in the last statement the part is identified with the whole. These are logical fallacies, and we do well to resist the temptation to confuse or identify the part with the whole. If we cannot transcend this fundamental logical fallacy whether in thought or emotions we will forever struggle with racism, bigotry, and delusional confused thinking. Never confuse the part with the whole.





It is no wonder that followers of Christ are called the Body of Christ. After all, sharing in the same spiritual food and sacred meal, they become what they eat and reveal the Divine Image. There is so much power for healing in the community of believers. Through the Eucharist, Christ becomes as present in those who have partaken of his Body and Blood as he has the elements themselves. The very presence of God touches the depths of the human soul and visits a part of us that no human being can ever hope to explore. We are God's. The sacred Eucharistic meal is a celebration of intimacy, the reunion of two loves in constant search of and longing for the other.
