November: The Celebration of All Saints and Commemoration of All Souls

The beginning of November is a reminder to all of us that the Church, that is, the assembly of believers for two millennia is composed of saints and sinners. In the case of the Saints, as I noted in my homily on All Hallows Eve – Halloween, these are the men and women of every time and place who fulfilled the two great commandments:

"The first is this: Hear, O Israel! The Lord our God is Lord alone! You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your mind, and with all your strength. The second is this: You shall love your neighbor as yourself."

Since heavenly life is to behold God and very the mystery of love in its Trinitarian perfection, nothing within us in conflict with this love can behold this presence. Saints are perhaps the most articulate when it comes to explaining the process of sanctification, that is becoming holy. Here are some words of wisdom from some of the most famous of them.

"Nothing whatever pertaining to godliness and real holiness can be accomplished without grace." ~ Saint Augustine of Hippo

[Ok, so holiness for us begins with God's initiative. -Fr. BP]

"All of us can attain to Christian virtue and holiness, no matter in what condition of life we live and no matter what our life work may be." ~ Saint Francis de Sales

[And everyone can become holy. - Fr. BP]

If God gives you an abundant harvest of trials, it is a sign of great holiness which He desires you to attain. Do you want to become a great saint? Ask God to send you many sufferings. The flame of Divine Love never rises higher than when fed with the wood of the Cross, which the infinite charity of the Savior used to finish His sacrifice. All the pleasures of the world are nothing compared with the sweetness found in the gall and vinegar offered to Jesus Christ. That is, hard and painful things endured for Jesus Christ and with Jesus Christ." ~ Saint Ignatius of Loyola

[But there will be trials, but nothing on earth compares to union with God. -Fr. BP]

"Holiness is a disposition of the heart that makes us humble and little in the arms of God, aware of our weakness, and confident -- in the most audacious way -- in His Fatherly goodness."

~ St. Therese of the Infant Jesus (Therese of Lisieux aka "The Little Flower")

[The Little Flower gives us the essential method. Begin with humility and trust! - Fr. BP]

"We must have a real living determination to reach holiness. I will be a saint means I will despoil myself of all that is not God; I will strip my heart of all created things; I will live in poverty and detachment; I will renounce my will, my inclinations, my whims and fancies, and make myself a willing slave to the will of God." ~ Saint Theresa of Calcutta

[And Mother Theresa shows us where the rubber hits the road. – Fr. BP]

If the process of sanctification depended solely on us, despair would be our default position. Since it is accomplished by God in the mystery of His grace, we all do well to remember our Savior's words as recorded in the Gospel of St. Mark which we heard a few Sundays ago: *"For human beings it is impossible, but not for God. All things are possible for God."*

The Commemoration of All Souls reminds us that living the two great commandments perfectly by the time of our departure from this world is unlikely, but nevertheless, God in His infinite goodness, has devised a place where those who die in His grace as friends, but have not allowed the totality of His ways to fully permeate every aspect of their consciousness, will receive the necessary purification. Thank goodness for Divine Love! Indeed, all things are possible for God!!!

November: National Vocation Awareness Week – November 7 -13

The Catholic Church in the United States will celebrate **National Vocation Awareness Week**, November 7-13, 2021. Dioceses across the U.S. will hold events to foster an appreciation for all vocations and pray specifically for those discerning a vocation to ordained ministry and consecrated life.

In his message for the 58th annual World Day of Prayer for Vocations, Pope Francis offered St. Joseph, the foster father of Jesus, as a model for vocational discernment. "Amid all these upheavals, [St. Joseph] found the courage to follow God's will. So too in a vocation: God's call always urges us to take a first step, to give ourselves, to press forward. There can be no faith without risk. Only by abandoning ourselves confidently to grace, setting aside our own programs and comforts, can we truly say "yes" to God," he said, and exhorted the Church to look to St. Joseph as an "outstanding example of acceptance of God's plans."

Saint of the Week

St. Frances Xavier Cabrini | Feast Day November 13

You may recognize the name St. Frances Xavier Cabrini (1850 – 1917) as the first United States citizen to become a saint. Known for her deep trust in God, she was a courageous woman doing the work of Christ.

Her life of service began when she was first refused admission to the religious order which had educated her to be a teacher. Not one to take things face value, she instead focused her charitable work at the House of Providence Orphanage in Cadogno, Italy, and in 1877, professed vows there and took the religious habit.

When the bishop closed the orphanage in 1880, he named St. Frances Xavier Cabrini prioress of the Missionary Sisters of the Sacred Heart. However, she had a dream she was determined to fulfill. Since her early childhood, she had dreamed of being a missionary in China. Pope Leo XIII, however, urged her to see the need in the west. She traveled with six of her fellow religious sisters to New York City, where they worked with the thousands of Italian immigrants residing there.

Although she experienced many disappointments during this time, she persevered. When she arrived in New York, the house intended to be her first orphanage in the United States was not available. Rather than come back to Italy and the order she oversaw, she instead found a way to establish that orphanage elsewhere — plus a few more. Throughout her life, she is known for founding 67 institutions dedicated to caring for the poor, the abandoned, the uneducated, and the sick. She died of malaria in her own Columbus Hospital in Chicago in 1917.




